There are 140,000 Holocaust survivors living in Israel today. Their average age is 85.7.

The scale and scope of their needs increase steadily as they face their final years.

At the Foundation for the Welfare of Holocaust Victims, we plan and implement support solutions that address the individual needs of any survivor in Israel.

In 2023 we offered a helping hand 152,558 times to survivors throughout Israel. Since October 7, we did so an additional 25,546 times to address war-related needs.

This year marks 30 years of caring for the daily needs of survivors. On this occasion we would like to take the opportunity to express our appreciation to our founding members, themselves survivors, who established this organization for the benefit of other survivors. Their work, which began in 1994, continues to this day and will continue for so long as there are Holocaust survivors among us!









# aftermath

On October 7, 2023 Hamas carried out the deadliest one-day attack on Jews since the Holocaust. The aftermath of October 7 presented a myriad of new challenges surrounding the needs of Holocaust survivors, many of them related to Israel being at war.

We responded to these needs from day one, and the numbers in this report reflect the breadth of our impact under fire, with thousands of Israelis becoming refugees in their own country – among them Holocaust survivors.

We provided additional war-related services to survivors, including personal visits to alleviate isolation among evacuees, and to monitor their wellbeing.

Tablets were distributed to survivors across Israel so they could join the online communities we launched to promote emotional resilience.

And we offered grief counseling to survivors, to our volunteers, and to their families.

# I want to go back and rebuild


Holocaust survivor Ruth Haran is a member of Kibbutz Be'eri, and was at home when Hamas attacked the kibbutz in the early hours of October 7. Her son, Avshalom, was slaughtered, and six other family members, among them children, were taken hostage.

"I live alone in a small apartment on the kibbutz. On the morning of October 7 I called everyone in the family but no one answered," recalls Ruth. "I went into the safe room and waited. About 10 hours later soldiers arrived to evacuate me.

"My heart was slowly breaking, I couldn't breathe. I told my granddaughter I would go and stay with her in Be'er Sheva."

At the Foundation, we immediately provided Ruth with a social worker who specializes in survivor care. She assists Ruth with endless practical issues that are the direct result of becoming a refugee, and helps her slowly process the brutal death of her son as she waits for her relatives to be released from Gaza.

From experience we know that the traumatic events of October 7 will likely trigger past traumas in Ruth, and we are there to ensure that she feels protected and safe throughout this horrific period.

# A special connection, despite the years

Aviva Yakar is a holocaust survivor in her eighties who has for years participated in our "Connected" program (developed in collaboration with Ort and the Ministry of Welfare), which strengthens the intergenerational bond between survivors and high-school students, thereby alleviating loneliness among survivors. The student assigned to Aviva was a young Shay Aros, who visited her regularly and with whom she formed a close bond.

"Even though there were 60 years between us, Shay and I connected and became friends," recalls Aviva. "He was a wonderful boy; he would come over, and we would laugh together. We'd have coffee and cake, and he would even bring me cakes he had baked himself. He came over on his bike to bring me a big, beautiful cake for my 75th birthday. It's difficult to describe how deeply that touched me. The cake had a picture of the two of us printed on it and a dedication: 'Happy Birthday, My Queen.'

"Even after Shay began his military service he continued to visit me. He came in uniform, and I hugged him so hard and asked him and God to keep him safe."

Tragically, Shay's short life was cut short on October 31 when, in a battle in northern Gaza, he was killed in action.

"He had so many plans. He wanted to succeed and make his parents proud. But God had other plans for him."


